

THE SWAC TOURNAMENT, BARONS, AND MLB'S EAST-WEST CLASSIC RETURN FOR 2026

After a thrilling slate of events in 2025, America's Oldest Ballpark is ready to welcome fans back for another remarkable lineup in 2026. From the sound of college bats to the roar of professional crowds and the pageantry of a Major League celebration, Rickwood Field continues to shine as one of baseball's most historic stages and a gathering place for generations of fans. Each new season adds another chapter to a story that began more than a century ago and still captures the city's imagination.

The action begins with the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) Baseball Tournament, returning to Rickwood May 20–24, 2026. Last spring, fans were treated to one of the most exciting finishes in recent memory as Bethune-Cookman captured the championship with an 11–9 walk-off win over Florida A&M. The five-day event

showcased the heart and history of HBCU baseball, with thousands of supporters filling the stands to cheer on their schools. This year's tournament promises more unforgettable moments, outstanding talent, and the spirited competition that defines SWAC baseball.

Next, the Birmingham Barons make their annual return for the 26th time since 1996, taking on the Pensacola Blue Wahoos on May 27, 2026. The Barons' 2025 visit was a tense, oldfashioned pitcher's duel that ended in a 1-0 loss to the Rocket City Trash Pandas. Fans can expect another memorable afternoon of Double-A baseball as both clubs don throwback uniforms in tribute to the Negro Leagues—a tradition that honors the generations of stars who once graced the same diamond and continues to inspire new fans every year.

Finally, Major League Baseball's East-West Classic: A Tribute to the Negro Leagues returns to Rickwood on Juneteenth, June 19, 2026. Last year's contest saw the West prevail 3–0, with legends such as CC Sabathia, Jose Contreras, Prince Fielder, and Andruw Jones taking the field in a stirring celebration of the game's Black pioneers.

The 2026 contest will once again unite baseball greats, families, and fans from across the country in a joyful, reverent salute to history and community. As another summer approaches, Rickwood Field stands ready to blend past and present, hosting champions, prospects, and legends alike, and proving once again that the spirit of baseball remains timeless on Birmingham's most hallowed ground.

BANANABALL RETURNS TO RICKWOOD!

The Friends of Rickwood are thrilled to announce that the Savannah Bananas' 2026 Banana Ball World Tour will bring two days of baseball fun to America's Oldest Ballpark, September 19–20, 2026. The games will feature two of the Bananas' newer and most colorful clubs—the Indianapolis Clowns and the Loco Beach Coconuts—in what promises to be another unforgettable Rickwood experience.

Rickwood Field has already hosted two sold-out Banana Ball events, each drawing more than 10,000 fans and introducing new generations to the magic of the

old park. The Bananas' 2022 visit set a team attendance record and marked Rickwood's first complete sellout since the inaugural Rickwood Classic in 1996. Their return in 2023 was equally electric, with fans lining up for several hours in the heat before game time and filling every seat for another day of joyful chaos. From choreographed dances to trick plays, sing-alongs, and baby races, the Bananas have turned the game into a two-hour celebration of fun and imagination.

The Clowns, a nod to one of the most famous teams in Negro

Leagues history, bring their own flair and humor to the diamond, while the Coconuts add island-style energy and a roster full of entertainers who blur the line between player and performer. Together, they capture the spirit of Banana Ball: fast-paced, fanfirst, and always unpredictable.

Tickets for both games are expected to sell fast, and fans are encouraged to follow the Savannah Bananas online for on-sale information. Once again, Rickwood Field will prove that baseball's future and its past can share the same stage—and that fun never goes out of style.

THE 2025 WORLD POLICE AND FIRE GAMES

For ten days in late June and early July, Birmingham hosted the World Police and Fire Games, an Olympic-style event with first responders from around the world competing in various sports. An estimated 7,000 first responders competed in the competition, filling local venues and hotels with energy and camaraderie. The Games also provided a welcome boost to the local economy, bringing visitors, tourism revenue, and national attention to the city.

The baseball component of the Games was held at Rickwood Field and Hoover Metropolitan Stadium from June 28 to July 2, 2025. All of the participating teams were from the United States, with entries from New York, Philadelphia, Houston, Dallas, Huntsville, and Birmingham. The competition drew enthusiastic fans and rekindled old baseball rivalries among departments that have fielded teams for decades.

The New York Police Department team, with a 5-2 record, won the competition based on the tie-breaker system over squads from the Philadelphia Police and the New York Fire Department. The following is a complete list of scores of the games played at Rickwood:

IAN HANCOCK CLAIMS THIRD RICKWOOD HOME RUN DERBY CROWN

Cold winds and wet weather couldn't dampen the spirits—or the swings—at Rickwood Field on Sunday, October 26, 2025, as fans turned out for the annual **Home Run Derby** hosted by the Friends of Rickwood. Despite tough conditions that held the ball in the park, the afternoon offered plenty of smiles, memories, and baseball magic.

This year's event featured a special guest, actor **Dwier Brown**, who famously portrayed John Kinsella in *Field of Dreams*. Brown greeted fans, signed autographs, and even shared a game of catch with several attendees. His warmth and enthusiasm brought an added glow to an otherwise chilly day at America's Oldest Ballpark.

The 2025 field included a talented mix of newcomers and Rickwood regulars: Sonny DiChiara, Ian Hancock, Mike McHenry, Homer Bush, Jack Wilson, Corky Miller, and Kaden Burch. Conditions were far from hitterfriendly, with a damp field and a stiff wind blowing straight in from right. In the opening round, only DiChiara, Hancock, and McHenry managed to clear the fence once apiece.

The other competitors—Burch, Bush, Wilson, and Miller—took one more shot in a one-minute "swing-off," but none were able to reach the seats. That set up a semifinal round featuring Hancock versus DiChiara and McHenry versus Miller. Hancock, a Birmingham-Southern standout and two-time Derby champion, belted two long drives to

defeat DiChiara, while McHenry and Miller each managed one homer. After neither could connect in a one-minute tiebreaker, Miller graciously stepped aside.

The championship matchup came down to two seasoned sluggers. Hancock, still showing the smooth, quick swing that has made him a Rickwood favorite, launched two home runs through the cold air to blank McHenry, 2–0, and capture his third Rickwood Home Run Derby title.

Even on a gray day, the spirit of the game shone bright. Fans cheered, kids shagged fly balls, and once again, Rickwood Field proved that its magic endures come rain, wind, or cold.

MORE FROM THE 2025 SWAC TOURNAMENT

"The victory gave Bethune-Cookman its first SWAC baseball title since joining the conference in 2021." The return of the Southwestern Athletic Conference Baseball Tournament to Birmingham and Rickwood Field provided memorable moments, with none more so than the championship game. The top-seeded Bethune-Cookman Wildcats dramatically won the tournament final with a come-from-behind 11-9 victory over the second-seeded Rattlers of Florida A&M, when Andrey Martinez slammed a two-out three-run home run to centerfield to end the game.

In the back-and-forth contest, Bethune-Cookman jumped to an early lead, scoring three runs in the second, which featured a steal of home by Wildcat Sergio Rivera. That lead stood up until the sixth frame, when FAMU, with the bases loaded, parlayed a bases-loaded single by Justen Crews for a run. A walk by Colton Ryals and a sacrifice fly by Matthew Perez plated two more

runs to knot the game at three apiece. The Rattlers scored four more runs in the top of the seventh to take a 7-3 lead, with William Brown and Crews both smashing two-run homers.

However, Bethune-Cookman struck for three runs in the seventh to cut the lead to 7-6 when Jeter Polle and Rivera drove in the runs on a pair of singles.

Florida A&M added a couple of insurance runs in the top of the eighth on the strength of a double by Jay Campbell. The lead stood at 9-6 in favor of the Rattlers, but the Wildcats retaliated with two runs of their own in the bottom half of the inning to cut the lead to one.

After a scoreless top half of the ninth, Bethune-Cookman put a couple of runners on base thanks to a single and an infield error.

With two outs, Martinez stepped to the plate and gave Rickwood Field another memorable moment as he belted a three-run home run to set off a wild celebration on the field and in the stands. The victory gave Bethune-Cookman its first SWAC baseball title since joining the conference in 2021. The Wildcats also earned an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

It was a fitting end for the SWAC Tournament at the nation's oldest ballpark, as fans from across the conference traveled to Birmingham, filling hotels and restaurants and showing strong support for the Magic City. Excitement is already building for next year's SWAC Tournament, returning to Rickwood Field from May 20–24, 2026.



Community-centered traditions also thrived this year. The fourth annual **Rickwood Home Run Derby** was a success despite some unpleasant weather that tested everyone's patience and umbrellas. Fans stayed, the competition remained spirited, and congratulations go to **lan Hancock** for capturing the title. Events like the derby remind us that Rickwood is as much about shared joy and memories as it is about wins and losses.

With all these great activities in 2025, it has set us up for a tremendous 2026 and beyond. Next year will feature the return of the SWAC Baseball Tournament, a May visit from the Barons, another East-West Classic, and two games in September with new teams from the Savannah Bananas' league. We are planning as far ahead as 2027, when the SEC's University of Missouri visits in February of that year.

None of this is possible without the generosity of our donors, supporters, volunteers, and board members. Because of them. Rickwood Field continues not just to endure, but to flourish. We are deeply grateful to the City of Birmingham, its elected leadership, and our community partners who continue to stand with us. RICKWOOD'S CHAMPIONSHIPS: THE 1958 BIRMINGHAM BARONS

If you wander over by the thirdbase side of the exterior grandstand, you'll see that the Friends of Rickwood have commemorated the championship clubs that have called America's Oldest Ballpark home from 1910-1987. This series remembers those teams.

The 1958 Birmingham Barons stand alone in the long tapestry of Rickwood Field history. Managed by Cal Ermer, the club finished 91-62 (.595), captured the Southern Association pennant by 6.5 games over the Mobile Bears, swept through the SA playoffs. and then defeated the Corpus Christi Giants to win the final Dixie Series between the Southern Association and the Texas League. No other Birmingham team ever claimed all three crowns-the SA pennant, the playoffs, and the Dixie Series-in a single season.

The Barons were a balanced and formidable ballclub. Birmingham hit .266 as a team with 138 home runs and 35 stolen bases. Bob Thorpe led the way with a .324 average and 23 homers, while Lou Limmer powered 30 home runs, Steve Demeter added a .309 mark with 18 homers, and Mel Clark contributed a steady .295.

Twenty-two players from the roster reached the big leagues, a testament to the depth of talent assembled at Rickwood that year.

The pitching staff produced a 3.83 ERA and worked heavy innings to power the club's postseason run. Joe Grzenda went 16-7 with a 3.19 ERA across 223 innings; Bill Harrington delivered a sterling 20-7 campaign with a 2.99 ERA; and Phil Regan, later a long-time major leaguer, posted a 15-8 record over 201 innings. With reliable arms and a punchy lineup, the Barons proved built for October.

Birmingham opened the 1958 Southern Association playoffs by taking four of five from the Chattanooga Lookouts, including an 11-inning thriller at Rickwood and three wins at Engel Stadium. In the second round, the Barons eliminated Mobile in another five-game series, highlighted by a 10-inning victory in Game 4. That set the stage for the Dixie Series, a postseason tradition dating back to 1920 that baseball fans across the Deep South

once circled on their calendars every year. But by 1958, the Dixie Series was nearing its end. Attendance had slipped badlybarely over 18,000 fans attended the entire six-game set-and growing tension between the two leagues threatened the event's future. The Texas League had integrated in 1952, while the Southern Association refused to do so. During the 1958 Texas League playoffs, Austin's owner announced that the Senators would boycott the Dixie Series if their Black players were barred from Birmingham. When Corpus Christi won instead, the Giants chose to leave their Black players in Texas to allow the Series to proceed. It was a quiet but defining fracture.

On the field, Birmingham prevailed in six games, winning four of the final five. Yet the triumph arrived as the tradition itself was collapsing. By the winter of 1959, the Dixie Series was abandoned, and only a few years later, the Southern Association itself vanished. The 1958 Barons, champions of a fading era, remain the only Birmingham club to win the SA pennant and playoffs and the Dixie Series in the same year.



The 1958 Barons were managed by Cal Ermer. The team finished 91-62 (.595) and won the Southern Association (AA) pennant by 6.5 games over the Mobile Bears. This was the only Barons team to have won the trifecta of: (1) the SA pennant, (2) the SA playoffs; and (3) the Dixie Series during the same season in the history of the franchise.



RICKWOOD COLLEGE CLASSIC: FALL BALL EDITION





Mae, a shortened version of her full name, Willie Mae, showed up at the ballpark and immediately became a hit with the ground crew and board members. Mae mostly kept the rodent population down. It was her job and her payment. She usually slept in the seats. No one knew if she preferred the box seats or the cover of the grandstand roof for the bench seating.

Mae made herself useful by hanging around with the board members, trying to help with the chores like cleaning and vacuuming the conference room as well. She was not scared of anyone or anything. No task was too big for her.

On Friday, May 9th, Mae was accidentally locked in the conference room overnight. Fortunately, a workday was scheduled for Saturday, and she was not trapped in the room for the weekend.

FROM THE ROOFTOP

There are several events that all of us at Rickwood Field do not want to pass without comment in this newsletter. Leading off, congratulations to the Birmingham Barons on winning the 2025 Southern League championship. The Barons beat the Montgomery Biscuits in a hard-fought threegame series, winning the decisive game by a score of 6-3. Birmingham was the Southern League North Division second-half champion and had the circuit's overall best regular season record with an 81-57 mark. This marks the ninth time a Birmingham team has won the modern-day Southern League since its inception in 1964. The last time the Barons were back-to-back league champions was in 1928 and 1929 in the old Southern Association.

The **Black Barons** were the last Birmingham baseball team to win back-to-back pennants, winning the Negro American League in 1943 and 1944.

In July, scouts from around the country gathered at Rickwood for the Hank Aaron 44 Invitational Showcase Game, which featured the top 44 high school players in the country. We also note former Birmingham-Southern head baseball coach Jan Weisberg is now

the head man at Eastern Kentucky. Following the closing of Birmingham-Southern, Weisberg was head coach of the Valdosta State Blazers for the 2024 and 2025 seasons. It was on his recommendations that the Blazers stopped by Rickwood Field for a visit in April.

Taking over the reins at Valdosta State is **J.D. Hulse**, who was a four-year starter at Birmingham-Southern for Weisberg. Hulse became a star, owning many school and conference records in his four years. He would later rejoin his

mentor on the hilltop and follow him to Valdosta State, where he became the fourth head coach since 1967. Finally, thanks are owed to Samford's baseball coach and team for hosting Troy at Rickwood in November.

Gentlemen, congratulations and best wishes in the future. Please don't forget us at Rickwood. You are always welcome to bring your team to Rickwood or play a game on the field where 183 members of the National Baseball Hall of Fame have played their wares over 115 years.

DID YOU KNOW?





"Ed 'Satchelfoot' Wells was a member of the Birmingham Barons in 1927 and 1928 and compiled a record of 38-8 during those seasons with a 2.60 ERA over 405 innings."

Ed "Satchelfoot" Wells was a member of the Birmingham Barons in 1927 and 1928 and compiled a record of 38-8 during those seasons, finishing with a 2.60 ERA over 405 innings. He was the Barons' ace in 1928 as he threw 291 innings and finished with a 25-7 record to help Birmingham to a 99-54 record (.647), and a first-place finish in the Southern Association (A). That club had the most wins of any team in Birmingham's and Rickwood's history. Although the Barons lost the Dixie Series in six games to the Houston Buffaloes, Wells was dominant in Game One at Rickwood, as he shut out Houston, 2-0. Wells pitched 11 seasons in the big Leagues from 1923 to 1934 with the Detroit Tigers, New York Yankees, and St. Louis Browns. He earned a World Series ring as a member of the Yankees in 1932. Wells's uniform is part of the Friends of Rickwood's collection of baseball memorabilia.


